- DBE is performing work outside of its known experience or capability.
- DBE workforce is not under DBE's control/direction or work is performed by personnel employed by personnel employed by another business.
- DBE working without a subcontract agreement approved by the department.
- DBE obtained delivery equipment or financing of equipment from Prime or other subcontractor.

Materials Red Flags

- $\ensuremath{\cdot}$ Materials for the DBE are ordered, or paid for, by the prime contractor
- Invoices do not indicate the DBE is the customer
- The prime's employee and phone number is listed as the contact
- Materials come from the prime's stockpile or an affiliate of the prime

DBE Regular Dealers/Suppliers

- The DBE supplies a product on an ad hoc basis in relation to a particular contract or contractor
- The DBE acts as the middleman in the transaction
- The DBE supplements the distribution equipment without having a long-term lease
- The DBE does not regularly sell the materials or supplies required under the contract
- Materials are drop-shipped from the commercial manufacturer
- The DBE's employees are not operating the leased distribution equipment
- All materials are special ordered
- The DBE does not inventory the material

DBE Distributors

- Materials come from the prime's stockpile
